SPOTLIGHT ON CORNISH FOODBANKS

A huge thank you to everyone volunteering in and donating to our foodbanks. Thank you for all that you are doing to keep people alive during this crisis.

Foodbanks across Cornwall need supplies of all tinned, dried or long-life food items - with a typical food parcel including: breakfast cereal, longlife milk, soup, pasta, rice, pasta sauce, tinned beans, tinned meat, tinned vegetables, tinned fruit, tinned puddings, tea or coffee, sugar, biscuits and snacks.

Many of the foodbanks also collect: baby food, baby milk, disposable nappies, washing up liquid, washing powder, soap, dry dog food, canned dog food and canned cat food.

Transformation Cornwall has pulled together an update with details of 17 of the Cornish Foodbanks to help:

1. customers needing Foodbank parcel/support
2. potential (both corporate and

individual) donators of food/ money

3. strengthen, (and lessen), the work of the many dedicated and wonderful people behind the foodbanks

PLEASE NOTE: The mission of Foodbanks is to give out food parcels to people in need. Customers can access foodbanks with a food voucher. Many of the foodbanks now operate an e-voucher system but please check how your local Foodbank is operating.

There are many wonderful community food projects that people without foodbank vouchers can access and in many cases this may be more appropriate.

UNIVERSAL CREDIT CLAIMS UPDATE FROM DWP

People making new claims for Universal Credit will no longer need to call the Department for Work & Pensions as part of the process.

Instead, a bolstered frontline team will proactively call claimants if they need to check any of the information provided as part of the claim, as well as messaging them on their online journal to confirm details.

The move is designed to take some of the worry and frustration out of

submitting a claim, while speeding it up by putting an end to long call wait times. Please make sure any service users are aware that the calls could come from a 0800 or withheld number.

GREENING WORSHIP WORKSHOPS IN MAY

Members of the clergy, local worship leaders and readers are being invited to join one of two 'Greening Worship' workshops during the month of May.

The events will be held via Zoom, and encourage questions and the sharing of ideas via the 'chat' function.

"More and more churches are wanting to include the many aspects of environmental issues within their worship," said diocesan environment officer Luci Isaacson.

"Caring for creation has become one of the central themes in the life of our churches – you only need to look at the 2020 Live Lent digital campaign and the recent vote of General Synod to work towards a Net Zero CO2 emissions target by 2030," she said.

The Environment Core Group is offering these two workshops for worship leaders, lay readers and clergy to resource them to lead 'green' services in their own churches and potentially also in other churches in their areas.

The workshops will be held on Saturday, May 16, at 11am and Wednesday, May 20, at 7pm. Both sessions will be recorded, and links will be published on the environment page on the diocesan website.

The workshops will cover the theology underpinning our care for creation, and offer lots of examples of readings and prayers and suggestions for different kinds of worship. They will explore how this theme can be incorporated into worship at many different times of the lectionary year.

Luci will be on hand to share illustrations and activities she often uses herself.

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FUNDING

WESTERN POWER FUND

Western Power Distribution (WPD) has launched a fund for local authorities, parish or town councils, registered charities or community groups. This £500k fund intends to support communities affected by the coronavirus outbreak within WPD's operating region, by helping local organisations to deliver vital support and services directly people in vulnerable situations.

TESCO COVID GRANT

Tesco Bags of Help is responding to the current Coronavirus (COVID-19) crisis by setting up a new short-term fund to support local communities.

Due to the need to respond quickly to the emergency, there is a streamlined application process and payment process to make it easier to get funds distributed quickly. If your application is successful the fund will provide a single payment award of £500 to organisations who are supporting vulnerable groups.

The programme is set up to support organisational need in this time of crisis rather than fund specific projects.

ST MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS CHARITY LAUNCHES VRF EMERGENCY FUND

St Martin-in-the-Fields Charity has announced the launch of the Vicars Relief Fund (VRF) - Emergency Fund.

This fund offers vital support to people experiencing homelessness by:

- £150 for people experiencing homelessness to access essential items and basic needs. This grant can be requested to help access food and hygiene packages, as well as utility costs and other essential items.

- £400 for overcoming barriers to support. Individuals can use this grant to access the resources necessary to stay in touch with their frontline workers during the self-isolation period.

- £1000 to help people to access accommodation, so they can safely self-isolate during this outbreak.

CRISIS: IN THIS TOGETHER EMERGENCY GRANTS FUND

Crisis, the national charity for homeless people, has established the **"In This Together" emergency grants programme** in response to the emergency created by the coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis.

The emergency grants are intended to support local groups who are financially affected by additional demands on their resources and who have expanded their provision to meet the current needs of those experiencing homelessness across the UK (funding can be to meet additional demand or reduction in staffing or other resources caused by impact of coronavirus).

The following grants are available:

1. Small Grants - awards up to £5,000 for short-term responses to the coronavirus emergency (projects within three months), following a

limited/fast-tracked application process (payments made in advance)
2. Large grants - awards up to £50,000 to fund long-term needs and potential expansion or change in service delivery, following a full application process Funding is only available for organisations seeking to respond to needs identified due to the COVID-19 pandemic and not for broader work or other discreet projects.

There are separate application forms for request of up to £5,000 and up to £50,000. Further information, together with an application form, is available on the Crisis website.

Applications may be made at any time. Crisis will review all applications at the end of each week and make a decision on which requests to fund for that week.

VETERANS' FOUNDATION GRANTS FOR ORGANISATIONS SUPPORTING ARMED FORCES

The **Veterans' Foundation** provides funding for charities and other forms of not-for-profit organisation that are supporting serving and former members of the British Armed Forces, and sometimes their dependants, who are in need. Grants can be used for projects covering a range of aspects of social care for the Armed Forces community, including running costs, in the areas of (please note this is not an

exclusive list):

- Homelessness.
- Poverty.
- Disability.
- Reducing dependency on drugs and alcohol.
- Mental health.
- Marriage guidance.
- Care during old age, and
- Confidence building and social integration.

The remaining application deadlines for 2020 are Sunday, May 31, for the foundation's June meeting, and Wednesday, September 30 for the foundation's September meeting.
