The Pandemic has caused huge financial loss in the Church. Those churches which had a rigorous planned giving scheme in place (either via PGS or Standing Orders) have fared better than those relying on cash and fundraising, but all churches (bar one or two of our larger parishes) rely on fundraising events as well as occasional office services to meet their budgets.

2021 looks unlikely to be 'normal services resumed' and previous levels of income will still be down. However there are some basic actions that can be taken to maximise income.

- 1. Focus on establishing regular giving, preferably by joining PGS (a new online platform is due to be launched soon)
- 2. Set up the mechanics of online giving (essential for virtual fundraising)
- 3. Set up a **Finance Planning group** with a remit of
- Improving regular giving (plan a Stewardship Programme if appropriate)
- Communicating the financial situation to the congregation and community
- Fundraising

This Parish Giving Review highlights areas of stewardship which would benefit from some attention. Each deanery will receive a bespoke action plan, if that is requested, and Christine Salaman and Liz Wallace are available to assist with Deanery Planning.

The Parish Giving Review was circulated to all treasurers (227) with email (13 do not) on August 27th, 2020 with a reminder sent out again the following week.





Observation: Those churches who have a firm base of regular giving through PGS or Standing orders have fared better than those who do not. The comments selected were repeated many times and suggests we rely far too much on fundraising and we need to focus on building regular giving foundations.


ACTION: Promote more rigorously stewardship/giving programmes throughout the diocese both via the Stewardship (Parish Support) Team and via AMD and CMD





ACTION: Collate feedback from those who have used it to ascertain whether it is a useful site and beneficial enough to promote further to parishes.


Before Lockdown was your church open during the week?

Is your church open for supervised prayer now?




Observation:

Do you use the PGS wider community scheme?




Observations:


Observations:






Observations:


- 50% of parishes have received legacies


- Almost £7million have been received in our diocese in the last 10 years

A legacy policy allows the PCC to prepare and discuss how they would wish to see a gift used. It can also help to reassure those interested that the PCC has a policy in place.




Observations: Before GDPR treasurers received Stewardship News as a matter of course. 43 (plus the 13 not on email) are missing important updates and resources.

Observations: If you add 'We never had one' to 'I don't know' that amounts to 107 parishes who have not run a stewardship programme, i.e. 2/3 of the parishes who replied.

This highlights a few things:

- 1. Church leaders are not willing or equipped to do this, feeling it's 'singing for their supper'
- 2. Church income has relied on fundraising rather than regular giving, which, as we have seen, is vulnerable.

- Increase clergy training in this area via CMD and AMD channels
- 2. Provide more resources for leading these programmes

Final Comments from Participants

WEBINARS

- Stewardship seminars have been very useful. Action plans just delayed by lockdown.
- Appreciate all the efforts given by Liz, Chris and others in providing so much help and good advice via webinars and etc during lockdown, thank you!
- Thank you for all your webinars! I took a proposal to our PCC re alternative ways to give but it was deemed "begging for money" which was considered "inappropriate during Covid times". We will hopefully return to this in the near future
- Well done girls with all your webinars, though I have missed a few. Steward Programmes are the way forward, every one should have one(Have you heard me say that before?!?) IT has enabled us to meet MMF in full for 30 years so far.

CONTACTLESS DEVICES/ONLINE GIVING

- It would be good to bring contact less giving machines out to parishes if only to lend for 6 months to see how they go
- Awaiting delivery of Goodbox Core for permanent installation. Stewardship Campaign will be reviewed after Pandemic.
- Thanks for the reminder that I haven't done anything about giving online via ACNY! On my to do list!
- We have considered WiFi in the church but cannot support the cost of the provision.
- We have an aged but very small congregation of approx 8 people. All give by the orthodox method as technology is often beyond us!!

FUNDRAISING/FUNDING

- Please can we get our church open DAILY as we are missing a lot of our visitors leaving donations. ps. the village pub is open all day with no face coverings needed !!!
- Would like to have more information re accessible grants though it's probably my fault for not following up on information sent out. Some of the funders meetings are not held at the right time for us or at the right place. We've found this when we were suddenly given the money to do projects we had planned for years. Can we claim grants retrospectively?
- Our income has fallen very dramatically this year through lack of fundraising. Although we have a very small population the community supports our fundraising efforts for which we are very grateful. We still seek to be a presence in the community and these efforts will continue as we struggle along.

Final Comments from Participants cont....

MMF

- Due to lack of fund-raising events and lowered regular giving, we will be unable to meet its MMF commitments in 2020.
- Our MMF call this year looks a long way off! The future is uncertain.
- We are, thankfully, able to meet our MMF and other financial obligations and running costs annually and donate to Christian charities we support.
- Coronavirus has deterred numbers of our elderly congregation from returning to church worship. Last year our average congregation was 13 or 14, in the future we're looking at 6 to 8. This year we will, for the first time ever, default on our £17,500 MMF share. We are deeply ashamed of this and ask for God's forgiveness.
- It would be helpful if Diocese gave indication of how MMF shortfall in 2020 would be managed and how MMF process for 2021 would be rolled out
- We are struggling to meet all our commitments and at the moment will not pay our total MMF and our ability to raise funds has diminished substantially
- As already indicated, we can call on reserves to make MMF this year, but MMF next year will be hard unless we can get weddings funerals and fundraising back online.

Final Comments from Participants cont....

GENERAL INCOME

- Our income has fallen very dramatically this year through lack of fundraising. Although we have a very small population the community supports our fundraising efforts for which we are very grateful. We still seek to be a presence in the community and these efforts will continue as we struggle along.
- I found the question on the reduction of income very difficult to calculate as it is so seasonal for us between Easter and October and if anything I have underestimated the amount.
- During the lockdown 8 members of our Church left. They said they were unhappy with CofE policy, and their money was unlikely to be used as they wished. This amounted to a drop in planned giving from £2700 to £1200.
- Our church was closed for renovations. These have stalled because of Covid and it is very difficult to know how much income has been lost when the church was expected to be closed but has been closed for longer than expected.
- We have to be careful to emphasise that the church is more than money, otherwise we will be failing in our duty of care. It is a difficult balance, money is needed to support the fabric of the church, but from our experience, gaining public confidence through taking time to talk, to WELCOME, whether it be at public events, or just being at the end of the phone.
- The biggest negative impact on giving in our Parish in recent years has been the upheaval of becoming a Benefice and having to share the attention of our well loved and hard working Vicar. Then his well earned retirement followed by a year of Transition then a year of a new Rector who resigned after some 7 months. Then a near year of Transition and Covid. Regular attendees and regular donators have drifted away as the time of turmoil and lack of focus has continued.
- We are fortunate to receive six regular donations from individuals who are not members of our congregation
- The mood in the Parish has been dulled following the suspension of the incumbent some while ago. That issue and his continued cost to the Diocese is still not resolved. This is not at all helpful to stewardship in the parish or the wider mission of the Church. It also is holding back any fundraising approach to the wider community.
- The problem in rural parishes, and it was thus in Herefordshire where I was Hon Treas for 20 years, we lack new churchgoers. Occasionally someone moves into the area and joins us we have had 1 in the 5 years I have been HT apart from self and wife we moved here 6 years ago. It will remain a struggle unless there is a world war I reckon that might bring a few of the faithful back!!
- The current year is going to be difficult!
