How does the course work?

The course will be delivered by CMS and partner dioceses. This gives a rich mix of contexts and approaches. There are six module weekends: two experienced pioneer practitioners co-facilitate each module. The modules run from Saturday morning 9am to Sunday 1pm. Learning is hybrid - a mix of online, onsite and streamed over the year. The course is hosted by the local Hub leader and a chaplain offers pastoral care.



Where do modules take place?

There are six module weekends. Some of these weekends will be in-person with the other dioceses and some will be in-person with your group in Truro. When you are in your local 'hublet' group we will be connected to the other groups via Zoom. Locations of each module will be confirmed before the start of the course.

In addition to the module weekends, there is an induction session before the start of the course.

How will you evaluate my learning?

We set two tasks after each module. In them we ask you to demonstrate what you've learned in whatever way suits you best. You get positive written feedback on your work and advice on how to extend your thinking or practice.

How do I apply?

Register your interest as soon as possible with Lindsey Morgan-Lundie (details below). If you want to talk to someone first who has done the course she will sort that out for you.

There will be two rounds of applications, including a couple of taster sessions. Dates to be confirmed.

What will I learn?

The course consists of six modules:

- What is pioneer mission?
- The Bible in context
- Doing theology
- Mission spirituality
- Mission ecclesiology
- Pioneering in the rural church

You will be part of a small group where you can grow deeper relationships and a support network. This will meet on two evenings between each module and be facilitated by a pioneer practitioner.

Cost

Students selected from Truro Diocese - fees will be sponsored, with the exception of travel, accommodation and meals on the two weekends away from the Diocese. Students applying from other church backgrounds will be charged £40 per module plus other expenses for the weekends away, these will be kept to a minimum wherever possible. Your church may be willing to contribute.

How can I use what I've learnt?

When you have completed the Certificate you may feel called to be recognised by your local parish or benefice as a Local Lay Pioneer. This means you can pioneer in your local community under the oversight of your church leadership team following a short service of recognition in your local church or deanery.
