FAREWELL SERVICE FOR BISHOP PHILIP

A Choral Evensong service of thanksgiving and farewell for Bishop Philip and Ruth Mounstephen has taken place at Truro Cathedral.

The service, which featured singing by the Cathedral Choir, saw Bishop Philip officially hand back the diocesan crozier as he prepares to head to Winchester.

The service was lead by the new Dean of Truro, Father Simon Robinson with the lessons read by Rachael Varney, Lis Escop Operations Manager and Lay Chaplain, and The Ven Kelly Betteridge, Archdeacon of Bodmin. Bishop Philip gave the sermon.

Following the service, there was an informal gathering which featured speeches by the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall, James Williams, Bishop Hugh Nelson, Archdeacon Kelly Betteridge and Gary Anderson, who spoke on behalf of clergy spouses. There was then the chance for those attending to say goodbye in person and enjoy refreshments with both Philip and Ruth, and of course, Noggin. The couple received cards, gifts, and well wishes as they prepare to leave the diocese in the next few days.

As well as the suffragan bishop, dean, archdeacons, General Synod members and other elected members, the Bishop's Diocesan Council nominates four additional members.


It is a unique privilege and a responsibility for members of the Vacancy in See Committee to contribute to the process of identifying a new Bishop of Truro.

NEW ROLES TO SUPPORT CLERGY AND RETIRED CLERGY

The Diocese of Truro has appointed Father John Eatock as Dean of Retired Clergy and Father Jeff Risbridger as Dean of Self-Supporting Clergy.

These roles are seen as vital in supporting people for whose ministry we will always owe a profound debt of gratitude, and in ensuring that we continue to hear their voices and promote the value of their contributions to our diocese.

"As a diocese we are committed to supporting the wellbeing and flourishing of all our clergy, throughout their ministry, and following their retirement," says Sally Piper, Head of Ministry at the Diocese of Truro. "All priests share the same call and have been ordained to the same ministry, but we recognise that there are particular perspectives and experiences, and sometimes additional challenges, for clergy who are self-supporting and for those who are retired, but continue to exercise an active ministry. I'm looking forward to working with Father Jeff and Father John to develop the support we offer to meet the specific needs of these particular groups of clergy, and I'm so grateful for their enthusiasm and commitment."

CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE AT HEART OF SEPTEMBER'S SYNOD

The second Diocesan Synod of 2023 took place at Bishop Bronescombe School in St Austell at the end of September.

The theme was 'A Church that conspiciously celebrates children and young people at its heart. and this was evident throughout the gathering as members heard from children and young people, listened to a presentation on the teaching of religious education in church schools and met the new interim Diocesan Director of Education, Lee Moscato. Lee explained that he was working towards a new strategy which would include looking at ways of making better connections between schools and parishes.

CREATION CARE SERVICE

A special Creation Care service was held at Truro Cathedral in September to highlight the urgency of environmental action, both locally and globally, and to emphasize the Diocese of Truro's commitment to climate justice.

The service included performances by the Cornwall Youth Choir.

"The choir were totally brilliant – they stole the show," said Rosey Sanders, one of the organisers of the event.

There was also a video presentation by children from St Uny Academy in Carbis Bay. The primary schoolchildren had been filmed cleaning up a local beach and arguing for the need to "take action now".

During the service, the diocese's Kernow Green Church awards were received by the parishes of Highertown, Padstow and Ludgvan. Representatives of St Kea, St Stithians, Madron, Redruth and Bradoc were there to accept their awards in the national Eco Church scheme. The awards were presented by Diocesan Environment Officer, the Reverend Ben Lillie.

"The Creation Care service of celebration and thanks is such a pivotal part of our ongoing work to cherish creation, cut carbon and speak up," Ben said. "When we recognise and honour all the efforts, however small or big, of our amazing champions, we're saying this work is valuable, and each of us is valuable and has a unique role to play. It's a genuine privilege to work with such an extraordinary group of volunteers and celebrate their successes."

The service also coincided with the news that the diocese has earned its own diocesan Eco Church award.

DIOCESE AWARDED BRONZE ECO CHURCH AWARD

The Diocese of Truro has been awarded bronze in the national Eco Church award system which recognises the environmental work achieved by churches and church organisations.

The diocese registered for consideration for this award in February 2021, when it created its Creation Care Group and its Diocesan Environment Board.

The award recognised that five per cent of churches in the diocese have now earned their own Eco Church awards, and that ten per cent have registered into the Eco Church process. It also required that

Church House itself earn such an award, which it achieved in August 2022.

In working towards this award, the diocese has embedded environmental issues within its ongoing ministerial training. For example, it ran a continuing ministerial development day on these topics in March 2022, followed by a Bishop's study day that June. Diocesan Synod in May 2022 focused on Creation Care and Net Zero, and in February 2023 the diocese implemented an ethical investment strategy, divesting its investments in fossil fuels.
