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## 140 ATTEND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CONFERENCE

Over 140 people attended Truro Cathedral to take part in the annual safeguarding conference which this year focused on domestic violence and the myths surrounding it.

The one-day event, which included stands by local domestic abuse support agencies, was supported by a ten-day exhibition featuring survivors art.

Dr Maryyum Mehmood, Research and Policy Advisor (Spiritual Abuse Lead) to the Domestic Abuse Commissioner of England and Wales, was keynote speaker. Talking to the safeguarding team after the conference, Maryyum said: "Thank you for arranging such a fantastic conference. It was a pleasure and privilege to attend and contribute to such an important discussion. I have marked the annual conference as a case of best practice that others across communities could learn from."

The Rt Revd Hugh Nelson, Acting Bishop of Truro, gave a powerful and moving address about domestic violence. You can read his speech here.

Following a lunch, those present were able to hear from two survivors – Red and Serran – about their experiences.

The afternoon saw a panel of experts take part in a Q& A session.

Lora Prynn, Assistant Diocesan

Safeguarding Officer and one of the conference organisers, said: "The day was fantastic, and the team are so grateful to everyone who attended not only for their physical attendance and support but for allowing themselves to be challenged.

"Domestic abuse support and advocacy is something I am incredibly passionate about, and it was heartwarming to have professionals, victims, survivors and thrivers in one place offering insight and reflection on how we need to continue to do better to support families impacted by domestic abuse.

"There have been local connections made as a result of this conference that I am confident will continue to grow and through that can only strengthen our safeguarding knowledge and responses in this area."







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## GROWING LINKS BETWEEN CHURCH, SCHOOL

& HOME

An initiative to boost connections between church, school, and home is starting to take off in our diocese with the creation of the first Growing Faith Learning Hub in West Wivelshire, and the idea is in action in Trigg Minor & Bodmin.

The aim of the Learning Hubs initiative is to put children, young people and families at the heart of all ministry and mission by creating resources that supplement the RE curriculum and Understanding Christianity resource that is in 7,000 schools nationally.

In West Wivelshire, Revd Ben Morgan-Lundie, Rector of Looe Valley Benefice, is working with Dave Hannah, head teacher at Duloe School to set the Learning Hub up. The pair had applied to become a hub and were one of 12 out of 32 applications accepted.

Ben said: "We are delighted that we have been selected as one of the new hubs and recognise that we, the Diocese of Truro and our diocesan church schools, will be helping to create something of national importance. We are committed to growing and strengthening the links and understanding between school, home, and church. This project gives us more focus to build on the existing relationships."

Dave said: "What is particularly exciting about this venture, is that it is child driven. We are listening to what the children want and basing our approach on their thoughts and comments."

And this way of thinking and working is already having an impact as St Mary's Church Bradoc (Trigg Minor & Bodmin Deanery) discovered. Rob Pearce, Churchwarden at Bradoc, explains: "When we started our creation



care journey ten years ago, one of our questions was how we as a church related to our school children and how they relate to Christianity, adults and creation. Part of our learning process was the thought that grownups and children may have very different values and that at church there is little discussion as to what Christianity is. Yet talk to a child and they have a deep understanding about creation and Christian distinctiveness given them by school and we needed a bridge between them."

Five years ago, the parish adopted the 'Understanding Christianity' approach of the national curriculum for schools, used in every maintained and church school as a means for all of us of all ages, to better understand Christianity and get a common baseline.

Rob said: "As a PCC we gave the 'Understanding Christianity Big Frieze' (a 4.8m long eight panel graphic dealing with books of the Old and New Testament) to our school to display in their hall and put a 2.4m one up on the north nave of the church. Our children from our local schools now know that our belief in Christianity and Creation is the same at school or at church. They view the church and school as one Safe place with daily collective worship and pioneer ministry."

This approach proved to be working when on Christmas eve morning a visiting family with two primary aged children came to the church. The two young children went up to the frieze and told their parents all about creation. Rob added: "It was our Christmas miracle."

It has been announced that the welcome service for the Rt Revd David Williams, the bishop elect of Truro, will take place on Saturday, May 17 at Truro Cathedral.

#### HAS YOUR PARISH JOINED THE PARISH GIVING SCHEME?

This year we are celebrating the tenth year of the Parish Giving Scheme (PGS) in Cornwall!

In 2024, over £1.1 million was processed through PGS from regular givers across the Diocese of Truro. With the addition of Gift Aid collected on their behalf, parishes received £1,347,302! One-off gifts further enhanced this total by £25,500.

In 10 years, over £8.8 million has been received in parishes by way of regular gifts. The PGS Average Weekly Gift (AWG) is between 10% to a whopping 43% higher than other forms of regular giving, the PGS AWG across the diocese being £14.53. 44% of givers have opted in to Inflationary Increase, which prevents static giving in the church.

#### **40 PARISH OFFICERS WELCOMED TO CHURCH HOUSE**

## **EDJI SUPPORT FOR PARISHES**

The diocese's Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Justice (EDIJ) board have met to continue their planning work to support us all in this important area.

The group was formed in response to a Bishop's Study Day on Racial Justice where it was noted that Cornish people often feel discriminated against and that developed into a realisation that this needed more attention.

The work is still in its infancy, but it is hoped that eventually, this will help parishes and others to be more attentive to the needs of everyone in our communities.

This is an area in which parishes are already showing an interest. Rebecca Evans, Ministry Development and Inclusion Officer, said: "A number of parishes have asked for an equity and diversity policy. This work is about being intentional and integral to what we do – we recognise how busy parishes are and don't want this to become another thing to do – it is more about how we do things."

Rebecca added: "Christianity has always been about working on the margins, this is what Jesus did and what we are continued to be called to do today. Focusing on equity, diversity, inclusion and justice, helps us to be intentional about that whether that is to do with race, gender, rurality, disability, sexuality."

It was agreed at the meeting that the work of the board will be pinned to four key themes of 'valuing difference', 'promoting equity', 'confronting discrimination' and 'managing inclusion'.

Within each of the four areas, there would be planning with short, medium, and long-term work and aims.

Lee Moscato, Director of Education and Chair of the EDIJ board, said: "All of this work is in its relatively early stages, and we are excited about the impact that can be had. We discussed how we ensure that this is more than just a group of people meeting but that we make clear, courageous and intentional steps into this space recognising and celebrating that God created a universe of staggering diversity."
