HAVE YOUR SAY - HOW CAN WE BEST SUPPORT PARISHES WITH CHURCH BUILDINGS?



In 2023, the Diocese of Truro committed £22 million taken from Diocesan reserves over the next ten years to support parish and deanery plans; investing in the life and mission of the church in Cornwall.

As part of the <u>Asset Strategy</u>, £2 million of this is to be used to support parishes in the stewardship of historic church buildings.

We would like to hear from as many of you in parishes regarding what would help most.

Sadly, we cannot offer everything that might help and need to prioritise - so we are asking for your input into how best to allocate this resource to make the greatest difference in a lasting way.

More information about this work:

In our diocese we have 305 churches. The responsibility for each of these rests with the respective PCC and clergy – with a significant reliance upon the goodwill of volunteers to support

both fundraising and maintenance.

In 2023 PCCs spent an estimated £3 million on repairing and maintaining these buildings, a figure taken from parish accounts, so this does not begin to reflect the actual time and resources expended by parishes.

Anecdotally evidence is, whilst loved, these buildings consume much of the energy and funding available which might also serve for mission and ministry. And the fundamental challenge is that these wonderful buildings are mostly very old and often in need of major, unaffordable repairs just to stand still, let alone adapt for the future of its community.

Recently, thanks to grants from the national Church of England, the diocese has been able to fund a Church Buildings Development Officer, a role which directly supports parishes to plan, fund and implement works to the fabric of their buildings; and a Cut Carbon Support Officer for churches, who helps churches get warmer and cheaper to run whilst cutting emissions.

In addition, funding has meant the diocese could give out £136k in minor repairs and improvement grants in the past year; and another £35k in quick

wins for carbon cutting and energy saving measures.

It is hoped we will be able to access more external funding to continue these and we know, from take up and feedback, these measures are really helping parishes.

The challenge is that £2 million of Diocese of Truro funds will not go far if it is all given out in grants, it might cover five roofs, which would be great for five churches. but not the other 300.

We hope that we can use the money to support lasting change in as many churches as possible, not just in a few places. We can see work in other dioceses that makes us think this is possible.

We need your help (please respond to the survey) to complete the picture, we need to know what is right for Cornwall. We have a steering group with clergy, wardens, architects, funders, DAC members and heritage advisors, this group will help us with next steps and a strategy.

We plan to take a Diocesan Buildings Strategy to Diocesan Synod next year, please help us by responding to the survey and keep an eye out for the draft strategy in 2026. OUR NEWS NOVEMBER 2025 3


Select one (or more) of the organisations in the catalogue and decide how much you wish to donate, then either order by post or online.

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HOW ROSIE BECAME A PARISH YOUTH MINISTER

Rosie Blyth had a decision to make. She was 18, had finished school and a whole world of possibilities lay before her.

Should she follow her friends to university and study her desired degree in history and politics at Southampton, or should she take a gap year?

"I wasn't sure what to do with the rest of my life," says Rosie, now 22 years, "When I had finished my A Levels, I went to an event online run by South West Youth Ministry (SWYM). That's where I heard about 'Be Transformed' gap year."

This choice began the path towards her current role in the Diocese of Truro as St Austell Parish's Youth Minister.

Rosie's parents became Christians after moving to California, America, when she was just two years old.

Rosie says: "I have grown up in church and throughout my teenage years I've encountered God. When I was 13, I made the decision to get baptised.

"I hadn't really fully committed at that age though as I wouldn't call myself a Christian at school. It wasn't until lockdown, when I was 17, that I started to read my bible and pray for my world more."

It was in her gap year that she found herself becoming closer to God.

"I had never experienced being around so many young adults – who were my course mates – with a faith," she explains. "During this year, I studied theology and was also encouraged to look deeper into my own faith.

"I also worked in the church and took part in youth and children's work."

After this gap year, in 2022, Rosie decided to continue with SWYM and her placement at St Austell Parish and join the degree programme studying at Moorlands College.

She says: "I was working with the church for 24 hours a week and then studying for the rest of the week."



When she finished her studies, she was invited to stay as the youth minister in

St Austell and started her role at the beginning of September. She is certain this is right where God wants her.

She says: "Growing up, I never had a 'I want to do this with my life' idea.

"But I now believe God was calling me to youth ministry."

Rosie loves working in her new role.

"The best part is actually getting to spend time with young people and see the way they are growing, as well as laughing and having fun with them," she says. "Being a teenager is an exciting time in your life. As a youth minister, you really see that in them. It is great because I get to see what they are like when they are out of school. Watching relationships growing between them, and being able to facilitate that, is a joy."

Rosie is excited about the future as she sees more and more people wanting to learn about the Christian faith. She is encouraged seeing young people bringing friends along to Youth Alpha to find out more.

"There is an interest and hunger," she says. "We've also had several young adults come along to church in recent months, really searching for meaning, also engaging in Alpha."

MEMBER SOUGHT FOR MISSION AND PASTORAL COMMITTEE

This committee is a consultative body that scrutinises proposals for pastoral reorganisation, usually arising from deanery plans, before they are recommended to the Diocesan Mission and Pastoral Committee.

The committee meetings take place four or five times a year, usually hybrid with in-person attendance in Truro or the option to attend by Zoom.

The meetings are usually not more than two hours long, depending on the number of matters to be discussed and there is only a small amount of prereading required.

We seek a new member, lay or ordained, who has experience in parish life. Experience of engagement with deanery plans would be helpful.

MEMBER SOUGHT FOR GLEBE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This committee is responsible for the oversight of the management and development of the Glebe portfolio (land owned by the Diocese of Truro). The committee meets four times a year, usually hybrid with in-person attendance in Truro or the option to attend by Zoom. The meetings are usually not more than three hours long, depending on the number of matters to be discussed.

Having recently adopted a commercial assets strategy, in order to increase income generated from Glebe to support clergy stipends, we seek an individual who has experience in relation to commercial property.

PLEASE NOTE: These two roles (for Mission and Pastoral Committee and Glebe Management Committee) are not remunerated, but volunteers are encouraged to reclaim all necessary expenses of office. This includes things like travel, stationery and childcare to attend meetings.

Jim Seth, Diocese of Truro's Chaplain to Readers (Licensed Lay Ministers), said: "Bishop David presided, and Bishop Hugh preached asking us to look at what our real blessings are."

Mary Wren, who was licensed at the service, said: "It was a very special celebration to share with friends from the Roseland Benefice, Spiritus Theological College staff, Bishops David and Hugh and all the Readers. It was a blessing to be standing with the LLMs after our two years training together, now being sent on our way to serve God

in the Diocese."

Isaac McNish, Diocese of Truro Head of Ministry, said: "The Licensed Lay Ministry service was a time of real joy and gratitude. As new ministers were licensed and others renewed their commitment, it was a reminder of the depth of calling and service across our diocese."
